Friends and family members who live miles apart can easily keep in touch, sharing photos, videos and messages in real-time. This connectivity extends beyond personal relationships, enabling individuals to join online communities and discuss shared interests from hobbies to professional networking. For instance, LinkedIn has become a crucial tool for career development, allowing professionals to connect with potential employers and colleagues globally.
 3. Moreover, social media platforms have become powerful tools for information dissemination. News spreads rapidly through these channels, often faster than traditional media outlets. This immediacy has democratised the flow of information, giving a voice to those who might otherwise be unheard of.
 4. Despite these advantages, the impact of social media on communication is not entirely positive. One of the significant drawbacks is the potential for misinformation and fake news. The rapid spread of unverified information can lead to misunderstandings, panic and even harm. Social media algorithms often prioritise sensational content which can distort public perception and create echo chambers where users are only exposed to information that reinforces their existing beliefs.
 5. Another issue is the effect of social media on interpersonal relationships. The convenience of digital communication can sometimes undermine the depth and quality of interactions. Online exchanges often need more nuances of face-to-face conversations such as body

language and tone of voice, which are essential for effective communication. This can lead to misinterpretations and conflicts. Additionally, the curated nature of social media profiles can create unrealistic expectations and feelings of inadequacy as individuals compare their lives to the seemingly perfect lives portrayed by others.

Constant notifications and the pressure to stay connected can lead to stress, anxiety and decreased productivity. Studies have shown that excessive use of social media is linked to issues such as depression and loneliness, particularly among teenagers and young adults.

‘The Effects of Plastic Pollution on Marine Life’

1. Plastic pollution is a growing environmental concern with significant impacts on marine life. Every year, an estimated 8 million tons of plastic waste enter the oceans, affecting countless marine species. One notable case involves sea turtles which often mistake plastic bags for jellyfish, their primary food source. Studies show that over 50% of sea turtles have consumed plastic, leading to intestinal blockages, malnutrition and even death.
2. Another alarming example is the plight of seabirds. According to research published in the journal ‘Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences’, nearly 90% of seabirds have ingested plastic. Birds such as albatrosses and petrels often eat small plastic pieces mistaking them for fish or other prey. This ingestion can cause physical harm, reduce the birds’ ability to absorb nutrients and decrease their reproductive success. It is estimated that by 2050, 99% of all seabird species will have ingested plastic.
3. Moreover, plastic pollution affects smaller marine organisms, such as plankton, which are crucial to the oceanic food web. Microplastics, tiny plastic particles resulting from the breakdown of larger debris, are ingested by plankton. Studies indicate that microplastics are found in 73% of fish caught at mid-ocean depths. This ingestion not only harms the plankton but also introduces toxins into the food chain, affecting larger animals like fish, dolphins and even humans who consume seafood.
4. Efforts to combat plastic pollution include initiatives like beach cleanups, bans on single-use plastics and the development of biodegradable materials. Countries such as Canada and the UK have committed to banning single-use plastics by 2021. Addressing plastic pollution is essential to protect marine ecosystems and ensure the health of our planet’s oceans.

Among the three candidates, Nisha, Viren and Fatima, each brings distinct strengths. Nisha is highly skilled in filming and editing, which directly complements Nikhil's lack of technical expertise. However, her preference to work independently may hinder smooth collaboration. Viren excels in conducting field interviews due to his friendly and outgoing nature. He could effectively manage participant interaction-something Nikhil finds challenging-but lacks the technical skills needed for editing. Fatima, on the other hand, is focused, dependable and has some prior experience with similar projects. She is open to feedback, which would foster teamwork, though her camera-shyness may limit her contribution to interviews. Considering all aspects, Viren appears to be the best fit for Nikhil. His strength in managing interviews complements Nikhil's content expertise and together they can form a balanced team, provided they seek additional help for technical editing.
